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VICE PRESIDENT, VICKI'S REPORT ON THE MAY MEETING

In our first meeting after our Awards of Excellence Exhibition, those who won prizes were to discuss about their work. Unfortunately, only two people were able to make it and they did not have their work with them because they SOLD! Congratulations to all winners.

After we went around the room looking at member's Still Life paintings - always a worthwhile exercise, Jan Waldeck bravely asked the audience what she could do with her beautiful tea pot still life. People were only too happy to share their opinions and, of course, this procedure has both positive and negative attributes. On the positive side, you can get many ideas from others and one of these might just be the answer you were seeking, but on the negative side, it can be a bit too much information and difficult to take all suggestions in. To avoid this downfall, Greg Pastoll suggested that if people wanted to, they could take a picture with their camera, print it out and make the changes and then get it back to the artist. Another suggestion is to go and see someone who might have had a good suggestion (Thank you Mary Cowell) and discuss it further. The fact that there were so many suggestions is testimony to the enormous difference is "how we see things".



Somewhat reluctant to get up and talk about her "Best in Show", **Deb Armstrong** was, at first, a little lost for words. She stated "I don't know what to tell you as I have no process! I just do it!

I started at aged 8 in Port Kembla, NSW - each Saturday morning on my teacher's kitchen table in oils. She was a realist and I struggled, but then I won

100 pounds for the Junior Art Award (age 12) in the Wollongong Show for an abstract and I found that I really enjoyed painting in a loose contemporary style from then onwards". Deb paints most afternoons; she cranks the Opera music up and paints instinctively in a semi-abstract style with very few rules. A free spirit, Deb uses a limited palette of 2 – 3 colours, and works in acrylic, water-colour, oils and pastels. Depending on where her mood takes her, she often paints with just a palette knife and uses the fat part of the hand under the thumb as a blending tool. Not too fussy with washing brushes etc she was given some Incredible Brush Cleaner which she says has resurrected old brushes to new. (Note to self - Must get some!) Two of Deb's favourite artists are Shirley Travena and

Chris Forsey, both from the UK. Deb has created her own style which she keeps simple yet dramatic.

Our President, **Jenny Rawlinson** who won this year's best oil with "Not Yellow Mellow". Very organised, Jenny had a "few notes" in case she forgot something. Jenny has always loved drawing and returned to painting while travelling extensively overseas where she left some of the rentals they lived in with wonderful wall murals! On returning to Australia she attended Karratha TAFE where she tried various mediums such as watercolour, pottery



and drawing. She finished her Diploma in Fremantle, majoring in drawing and pottery and winning the Graduation Drawing Prize.

For many years Jenny was a potter but eventually decided that you can seldom do everything well so switched to painting.

Oil painting was

inevitable for Jenny as she just loves colour and the lusciousness of oil paint. She often commences with transparent washes (in order to free up), blending and layering, usually done over several days so that thicker paint can easily be laid on top. Because Jenny is such a good drawer, she has to constantly fight the urge not to be too precise and tries hard to loosen up. Jenny buys her oils according to which colour suits her, for example, W & N Burnt Sienna and Permanent Rose for their lovely transparency. Needless to say, Jenny is an organised & methodical painter and is very fussy with her brushes! She has proven herself to be a very accomplished painter and at the moment has a pop-up art gallery exhibiton at Angelo Street, South Perth. See her brochure for more details.

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SKILL SHARE NO 2

Atwell House. Saturday 10th June





After the success of tour first skill share last year (was it really that long ago!) we thought we would try it again. The afternoon started off with our treasurer, Hadyn Kiesey, giving some expert advice about perspective. He showed us how to get 1, your eye level and from this 2 vanishing points on the same straight line. We were each given "angle sticks" to help determine these VPs. Sometimes, though, there is only 1 vanishing point. Not only do the angle sticks help you find the VPs but also determine the angle of parts of your drawing, be that the roof of the house, the line of guttering the bottom of two legs on a chair and so on. By holding the sticks near the surface of your paper you can transfer the angles to your drawing. While I can't say it was an easy lesson for many of us, we did learn a few things and it would be a great tool for any artist; particularly those who work in realism and buildings etc, as indeed Haydn's meticulous work shows. We thank Haydn for his infinite patience and dry sense of humour. He was certainly right when he warned us that "Perspective is a subject that can be a study in itself.

After the rather intense exercise that Haydn set for us, Hilda Klap gave us some light relief with her "Mark-Making" exercise. Treating a large piece of paper which had been taped into 6 sections, we were asked to treat the paper as one piece and basically do whatever we liked with it. First, we may have drawn some random lines over the paper with oil pastels or charcoal, followed by some acrylic paint, some stamping and general mark making with anything that comes to mind - bubble wrap, end of toilet roll, cardboard or plastic wrap or foil. The idea was to dry them off and then either frame individually or as a group or perhaps make cards or bookmarks with them. While there were no rules per say, it was suggested to leave quite a bit of white paper so that the painting is not too busy and not introduce too many colours as your piece can easily turn to mud. It was a lot of fun and was pure joy just to let oneself go with the flow and just play. Thank you Hilda.
