'Getting a likeness' always seemed to me to be a highly desirable but impossible dream. For most of my life it remained a dream. I was brought up at Warburton, near the centre of Australia, and Esperance - contrasting parts of Australia but both rich in colour and beauty. Plenty of inspiration for drawing and painting.



As an English and a Second Language teacher I used drawing to complement language learning. When I retired from the Education Department after 35 years, I went straight to Claremont School of Art and enrolled in everything. It was

KATY MAIR'S OPENING SPEECH

May 2023

2023 Annual Awards of Excellence

We are here this evening to honour the artists who submitted their creative pieces into the 2023 Annual Awards of Excellence.

What is the true meaning of excellence?

"Excellence means greatness — the very best. Achieving excellence is never easy to do. Excellence is a quality that people really appreciate, because it's so hard to find. Excellence is the quality of excelling, of being truly the best at something." What does it mean to be a person of excellence? It means that you strive to be the best you can be and to do the best you can do. Excellence reflects moral virtue and therefore strives toward what is positive, valuable, and praiseworthy.

I think we can all acknowledge that we have the opportunity to look at some beautiful and intricate works of art at galleries and in public places. Art takes time and thought for the artists to compose and present and that is what we are seeing here tonight.

Why should artists put their work in public places like galleries and so on. Well, it is important for artists to do this for three reasons:

- 1. To challenge themselves and others
- 2. To build character
- 3. To exhibit bravery and vulnerability Let us look at those points more closely:

1. "To Challenge themselves and others"

Public exhibitions give artists an opportunity to meet a learning objective or an art class goal. They can try out new styles and styles of famous artists. They can develop their creative thinking skills and explore new materials. They can have some fun in their creative endeavours.

How does this art contribute to the minds of us, the viewer? Art gives meaning to our lives and helps us understand our world. It is an essential part of our culture because it allows us to have a deeper understanding of our emotions; it increases our self-awareness, and also allows us to be open to new ideas and experiences. And most importantly, it brightens up our world!

2. "To build character"

Some of the common challenges faced by artists is finding aspirations. This is a strong desire to achieve something higher or greater.

It is often a long-term, overarching life goal or desire. Another challenge might be keeping up with surrounding talent. It could also be self-trust. An artist may have time constraints such as deadlines or a busy life. Some artists desire to be perfect. Some artists might be afraid of critics. So remember to be kind to them! Whatever it is, it causes an artist to spend some time thinking about their artistic endeavours. Facing challenges and navigating their way through these, builds resilience capacity. Knowing that one can overcome obstacles, learn from struggles and benefit from mistakes lays a solid foundation for success in life

3. "To exhibit bravery and vulnerability"

Art can help artists to express emotions that can feel unspeakable or inexpressible, such as despair, hopelessness, grief, fury, alienation, loss, fear and exhaustion, as well as more positive emotions such as hope and love. Often, these emotions are deeply tied up together and art can help express that complexity. Displaying deep felt art in a public places may cause some anxiety in artists who may feel their inner most thoughts are exposed and subject to judgement.

FINAL THOUGHTS

For an artist, an exhibition is a way to communicate with the world. Artists tend to channel their inexplicable and complex emotions into their greatest pieces. And through an exhibition, those emotions can now be communicated to the world. To the artists displaying their work here - sharing your art will encourage you to try new things, grow your skills, venture into uncertain but good paths, and help you find the courage when you need it to keep going.

Art is a way for us to see the good. Art brings more beauty into this world, which we need! Art exhibitions are a wonderful way to appreciate the creativity and hard work of artists as we are fortunate enough to see tonight. They allow us to see paintings that we may not otherwise see. They are also a wonderful way to spend an evening with friends as we doing here tonight.
